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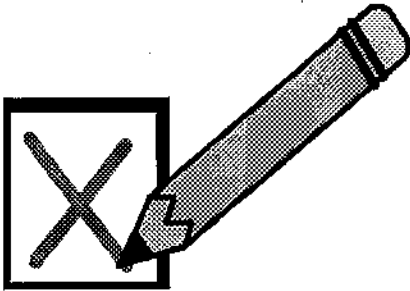

How do I find old law school exams?

The Library maintains a file of past law School exams back to 1960. Exams from 1995 to the present are available on CLARANET (the law school's intranet/electronic course reserve system).

TO FIND EXAMS IN THE LIBRARY:

- 1.) Come to the Circulation Desk and ask to see the index of old exams. The index will tell you what year we have on file for which professor and which course.
- 2.) Tell the desk attendant which year you would like. The exams are bound by year.
- 3.) Exam volumes check out for three hours and can not be removed from the library.

TO FIND EXAMS ON CLARANET:

You can access exams from the first screen of CLARANET by clicking on "Law School Exams."

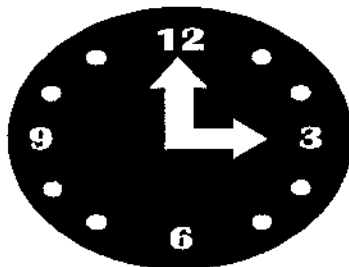

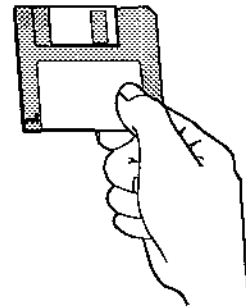
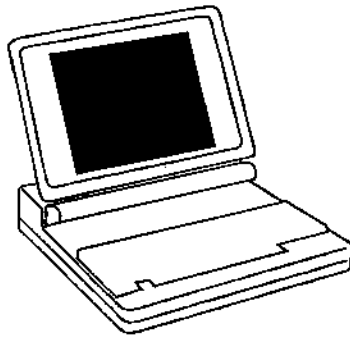

NOTE FOR STUDENTS TAKING EXAMS ON THEIR COMPUTERS

If you are planning to take your exams with your laptop, please note that the software has changed from last semester. You are required to download and install the new version of Softest. If you do not install the new version, you will not be able to take the exams with your laptop. Please do not wait until the last minute. Download the new version and install it now.

If you have softest version **2.0.92** or higher [to have this version, you must have downloaded Teststp.exe, the installation program, on **October 17, 2000** or later] you have the right software to take the exam. Otherwise please go to the Examsoft web site (www.examsoft.com) and download the new version. The installation is not complete until you have gone through a registration and verification process that occurs when you run the software for the first time. To complete this step you have to be connected to the Internet.

Softest installation for the new version is very different from last semester. There is a complete step by step instruction sheet available on the Student Records office web site at http://www.scu.edu/law/resources/records/softest_installation.pdf This is a PDF document. You can print these instructions using the Heafey lab computers. Please print out this document and follow the instructions for a trouble free installation of the Softest program.

If you need help a sign up sheet is available at the Law School Computer Services office in Heafey room 200. The computer services staff can assist you with the installation of new Softest.

COMPUTER LAB PRINTING REMINDERS

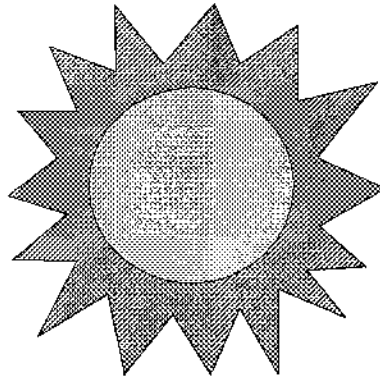
The library's three computer labs become very hectic during the waning days of the semester. To make printing as untraumatic of an experience as possible for you and your classmates, please remember the following.

EARLY BIRD STUDY SPACE

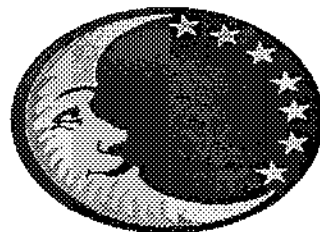
If you're anxious to begin drilling an outline into your head or you want to get in a quick review session early in the morning before the library opens at 8am, here are some alternative study areas available on campus:

BENSON CENTER:

Opens at 7:00am. The Mission Bakery opens at 7:30.

HEAFEY LOBBY:

Even though the library doesn't open until 8:00am the lobby of Heafey is available as early as 6:30am.



Conference Room reminders:

- The large conference rooms, White and Warburton, are for groups of six or more.

- Room reservations are only held 15 minutes. After 15 minutes the room becomes available to the next group needing a room.

- Rooms may only be reserved for 3 hours a day per group, not per individual. This is to ensure one group does not monopolize a room all day.

- The rooms are not sound proof. Loud noise will be heard outside of them.

- NO FOOD OR DRINKS ARE ALLOWED IN ANY OF THE ROOMS.

Need to watch a video?

Library materials that can help:

California Bar Preparation Material Heafey Law Library

This is a partial list of bar preparation materials owned by Heafey Law Library. For a complete list, search OSCAR by **subject** (not keyword) with this exact phrase (but without the quotation marks): "bar examinations -- California" .

Please note: since these materials need to be shared by everyone, do not expect either frequent or immediate availability.

Essay and Performance Test Materials

The Committee of Bar Examiners publishes the essay and performance sections of past bar exams. The following material is located in the California Collection and does not circulate.

KFC 76 .C3 California Bar Examinations. They contain the essay and performance sections of exams from 1950 through February 2000. However, they do not contain sample answers.

KFC 76 .C344 Essay Questions and selected answers from the California Bar examination. The library has 1981 through July 1999. These contain only the essay portion of the exam but also contain selected answers to that section.

KFC 76 .C35 Performance tests and selected answers. The library has 1983 through July 1999. These contain only the performance section of the exam but they also contain selected answers to that section.

MBE Materials

BarBri publishes law outlines and practice MBE (Multistate Bar Exam) questions. The outlines and MBE practice questions are

located the Stauffer Reserve Room.

KF303 B37 for outlines. The library has the 1999 edition.

KF 303 B373: Barbri bar review multistate testing and drills. The library has the 1999 edition.

PMBR is another commercial publisher of bar review material. The library has a collection of their practice MBE questions. They are located in the Stauffer Reserve Room at KF 303. M85.

A PEEK OVER OUR SHOULDERS



A glimpse of what the library staff is currently reading.

Reference librarian **Kathy Hall** is something of a reading refugee. Acquiring a BA in English, a JD, and an MLS has left her with a case of book avoidance. She prefers to spend her free time out of doors swimming, cycling, and hiking. When she does pick up a book it is usually something nonfiction as she finds that she has little patience with most modern fiction.

Kathy has recently read **The Professor & the Madman: A Tale of Murder, Insanity and the Making of the Oxford English Dictionary** by **Simon Winchester**. This book tells the fascinating true story of Professor James Murray, the man behind the OED. Aided by volunteers such as Dr. W.C. Minor, an institutionalized murderer, he created one of the world's most respected reference works. Kathy feels that the second half of the book, which deals with linguistics, is a bit dry, but she enthusiastically recommends the book. This book is available from Orradre Library.

Kathy is currently writing a review of **Documents on the Laws of War** edited by **Adam Roberts and Richard Guelff** for Law Library Journal, but she was willing to give us a preview. She highly recommends this book as an overall introduction to the subject matter. The opening chapter is especially informative for the uninitiated. The editors have included the full text of current international documents related to armed conflicts and the index is "very good". This volume can be found under call number KZ6385 D64 2000.

Doug Clapp, Library Specialist in the Cataloging Department, is a very different kettle of fish. He describes himself as a compulsive reader who has been known to read the phone book if no other literature was handy. While he does have other pursuits, such as raising his family and cheering the Sharks, reading remains his favorite occupation.

For the last three years Doug has been researching and writing a novel about the Knights Templars in thirteenth and fourteenth century France. This has focused quite a bit of his recent reading on history, psychology, spirituality, mythology, and artistic vision. When he takes a break from his own book he might read science fiction by **Orson Scott Card** or **Ray Bradbury**.

Doug is currently reading **An American Mystic** by **Michael Gurian**. This novel purports to be the journal of a college student who witnesses the birth of a new spiritual movement while traveling in Europe. Doug has no idea how the book will end, but recommends it as an interesting, thought-provoking read.

He is also reading **Newton's Cannon**, volume 1 of the **Age of Unreason Trilogy** by **J. Gregory Keyes**. This is a successful blend of actual historical figures, alternative reality, and fantasy. Doug thinks that this is "just a fun read" and highly recommends it. This title is available at Santa Clara City Library.
